OCTOBER LT MEETING HIGHLIGHTS



Financial Report: Expenses incurred over the past month included rental of scissor lift to apply additional spray foam to ceiling in Building Two. Additional expenses included parking lot light bulbs, fire extinguisher recharge, and furnace filters for all furnaces in both buildings.

<u>Trustee Report:</u> Installation of furnaces in Building Two is now complete. Roof replacement is currently underway on Reese Hall. (New roof has been completed at time of this printing).

General Report: Statistics regarding the recent voting results were presented to the LT. Jim Weingart presented these results to the congregation at both services on Sunday, October 16, 2022. Feedback is welcome via e-mail correspondence and questions are welcomed. A town hall type gathering similar to the "Time to Talk" meetings held previously will be scheduled to further discuss the voting results. An e-mail has been issued regarding membership, containing a list of members who have not been active or in attendance for at least the past two years. Removal of those members will be requested at the upcoming Charge Conference.

Pastor's Report: Charge Conference is scheduled for November 2, at 7:30 p.m. in Reese Hall. The District Superintendent will conduct the meeting via ZOOM, but the congregation is invited to attend and participate. Two proposals will be brought before the conference: (1) transfer of funds from current Steeple Fund to Capital Improvements; and (2) the redirection of Memorial Funds to Ministry Fund. Names will be suggested for approval to elect to the Leadership Team to replace four (4) current members who whose terms will be completed at the end of 2022. Thanksgiving Food Baskets will be distributed from Hope this November because of a scheduling conflict at Our Lady of the Lake Catholic Church. Hope's Trunk and Treat is scheduled for Sunday, October 30, from 2:00 to 4:00 p.m. in the Church parking lot. Fresh Expressions training is offered at Pathfinder Church in Portage, Michigan on November 12, 2022. Registration is \$30 per person. Please contact the Church office for additional information if you are interested in attending this program.


Thank you so much for all your cards and calls of encourage-

ment during these summer months. I have felt your prayers and even though I still have a ways to go before getting back to a normal routine for church, I still revere my church family at Hope.



Eight stained glass windows were created by the Chicago Art Glass Company for \$365 for the Edwardsburg Methodist Church, which was established in 1837. Many founding members of Edwardsburg sponsored the production and installation of the windows.

Historian Otis Montgomery reported that many congregants experienced "some discomfort" that the "all seeing eye" in one of the windows was always watching you; he noted that everyone was relieved when seating was moved to face west and their attention was refocused.

In1997 the Edwardsburg church merged with the Adamsville Methodist Church and built our current location at Elkhart and May Streets. The windows were removed from the old downtown church when it was sold in 1998 and stored—actually hidden—in a room specially built in a local barn with only a few knowing their whereabouts. Over 20 years later, with no restoration needed, the panes have been installed indoors with back lighting and are serving again to enhance worship in the traditional wing of the church.

A VETERAN'S SERVICE



American hero Eddie Rickenbacker (1890-1973) led a life of daring and risk, from racing cars as a teen to

piloting warplanes. Throughout his experiences, Rickenbacker grew in faith while discovering that "life had no meaning except in terms of helping others."

In the first issue of *Guideposts* magazine, Rickenbacker described spending four agonizing months of 1941 in the hospital after an accident. While recovering, he pondered life and death, concluding that he couldn't give up because he still "had work to do, others to serve."

Less than two years later, that ordeal came in handy. After crashing in the South Pacific, Rickenbacker and "seven other starving men" were adrift on a raft for 21 days. Most were "so young they needed the strength and understanding of a man who had been down in the valley of the shadow, who had suffered and made sense out of his suffering," he said. "It was clear to me that God had a purpose in keeping me alive. ... I had been saved to serve."
