The Prayer of Faith

James 5: 13-16 Is anyone among you in trouble? Let them pray. Is anyone happy? Let them sing songs of praise. Is anyone among you sick? Let them call the elders of the church to pray over them and anoint them with oil in the name of the Lord. And the prayer offered in faith will make the sick person well; the Lord will raise them up. Greetings and Blessings to you, Friends of Hope, in the name of our Risen Savior, Christ Jesus! As we enter into this Easter Season, let us do so with a renewed spirit and a revitalized hope for all that is possible when we faithfully place our trust in The One who was raised from death to life!

In this time of renewal, we are looking to approach Hope's Prayer Chain and Care Network in a new light. We are hoping that a few minor changes will inspire some new people to participate while also having a positive impact on those of you who are already participating.

For the Prayer Chain, we first want to invite everyone to participate in praying for those who are in need. If you aren't already signed up for our Prayer Chain updates, please contact the church office so we can add you to the distribution list. We usually send out updates twice a week, on Mondays and Thursdays (Thank You Marti!). The minor change we are trying out in this new season is this: Our email updates will no longer contain the entire list of names and concerns, but instead will only contain our most recent, (hopefully) short-term additions. Our prayer list for long term concerns, such as chronic illnesses, pastors, and the home bound, will appear at the end of each monthly newsletter. If you are wanting to actively join in our prayer chain (and we hope you are!), we ask that you remove this long term list from the newsletter and add it to your current prayer routine. And then, when the updates come out during the week, take time in that moment to pray for those newly added concerns. If those who appear on our recent additions throughout the month need to become long term prayer concerns, the list in the newsletter will be updated accordingly.

For our Care Network, we are hoping to find one person within our active congregation to be our team coordinator. The Hope Care Network represents the process by which our prayer concerns become tangible ways in which we can take action by reaching out to, connecting with, and helping and serving those who are in need. The Care Network Coordinator does not need to be the doing the actual outreach, but simply the one who oversees the flow by which our love for one another turns from prayer to action. We have a detailed structure for this network, a large and active prayer chain, and multiple people willing to help with the outreach side of things. We are looking for one person to help coordinate these efforts, and we are willing to adjust structure to match the gifts of that person. If that person might be you, please let us know. If you have someone in mind for that role, encourage them to consider serving the church in this very special way.

God has called us for this purpose; we are blessed to be a blessing!

DEATH DOESN'T WIN



In the final hours of 2021, a wildfire near Boulder, Colorado, destroyed 1,000 homes, including one belonging to Pastor Bill Stephens. His family, out of town at the time, lost all their possessions. After months of feeling buried in debris, insurance paperwork and mourning, Stephens decided that Easter 2022 would mark a fresh start.

During worship that morning, the pastor shared a photo of vibrant daffodils emerging on his charred property. Burned remnants were visible in the background, just as Easter's backdrop includes the pain and death of Good Friday. But the empty tomb in Easter's foreground means death won't win, reminded Stephens. Even when earthly life "isn't all daffodils," we have hope and eternal life through Jesus.

Easter reveals that God will "give us the joy, and it's going to be in the heart of pain that we go through as well," added the pastor. "And that just makes me draw closer to God."

HOW JESUS SAYS YOUR NAME

It's been said that when someone loves you, they say your name differently. Your name is "safe" coming from their mouth.

Mary Magdalene found this to be true. Walking alone in the dark to Jesus' tomb, she wanted nothing less than for a concerned loved one to interrupt her private grief, crooning her name in pity: "Oh, Mary, there, there." Or worse, someone from her old life who would spit her name like a curse, not knowing that Jesus had cast out her demons. But then Mary saw the tomb open and panicked, ran to get Simon, hurried back to the garden. Angels addressed her — not by name, just "Woman ..." — and then a gardener: "Woman ..."
